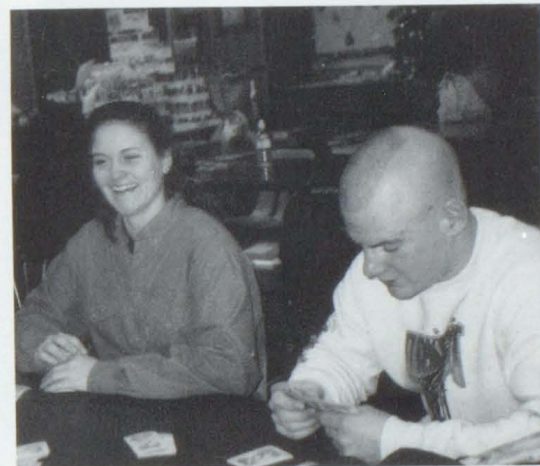




Christmas Fun Day

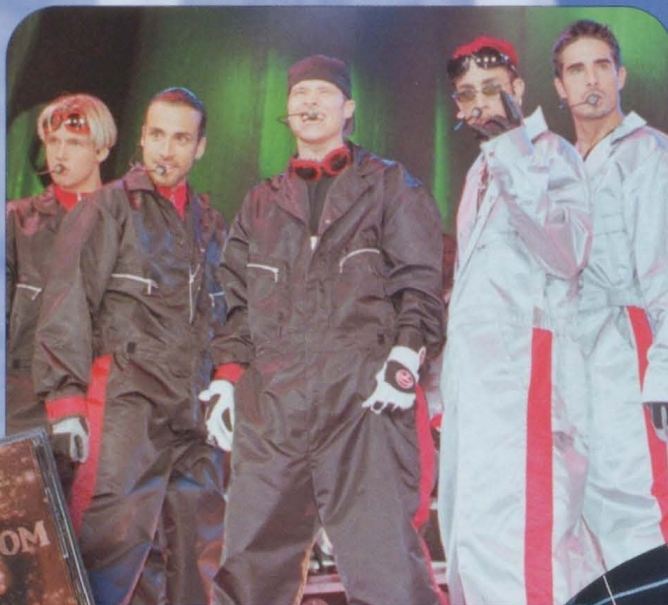

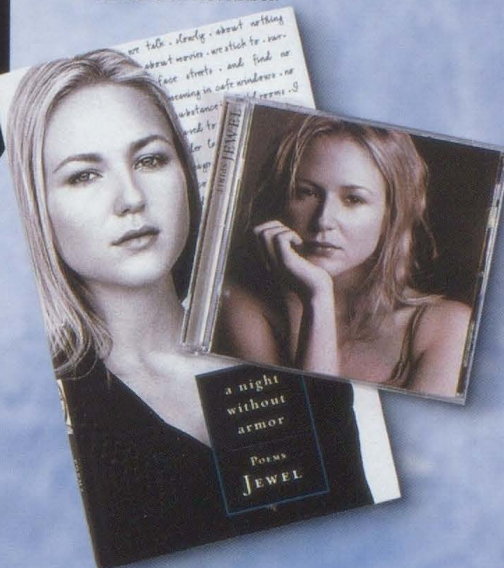

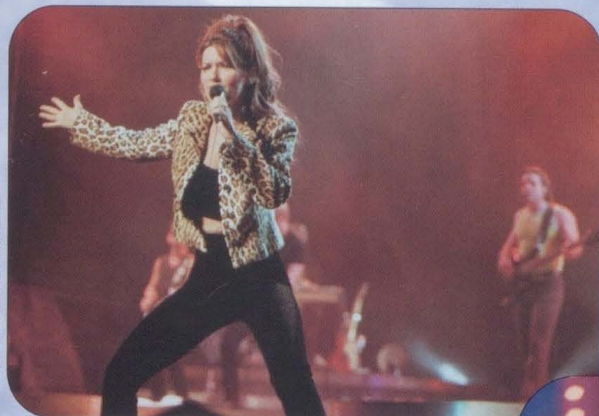

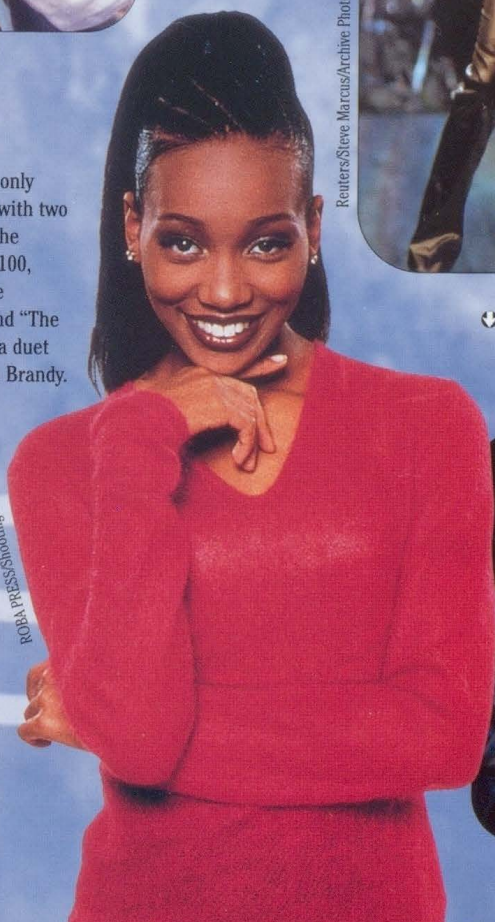

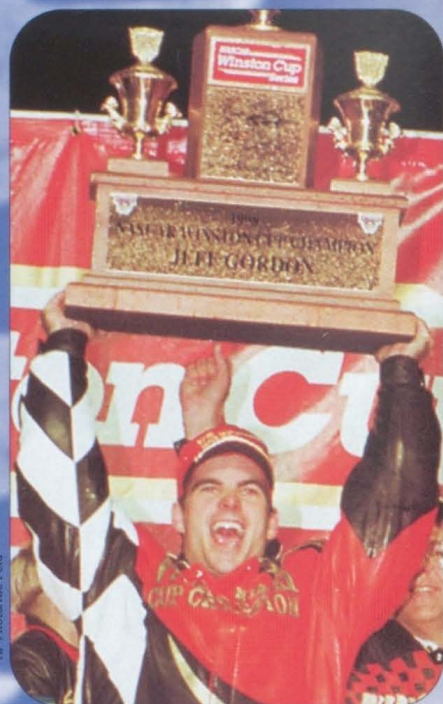

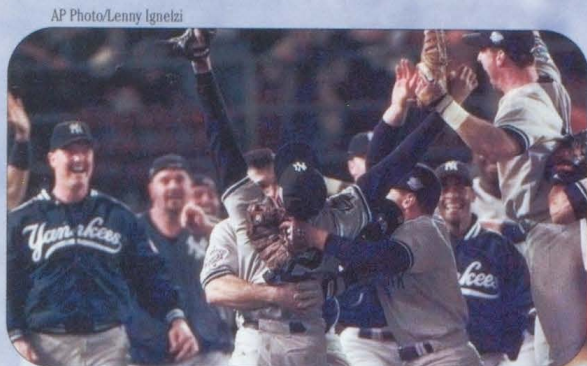

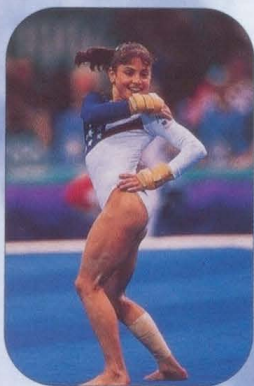

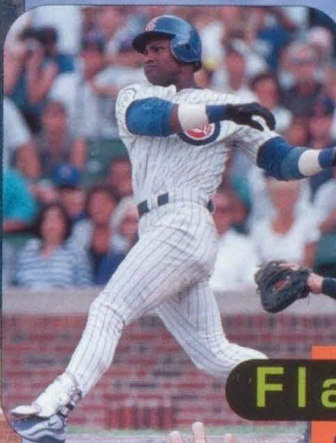

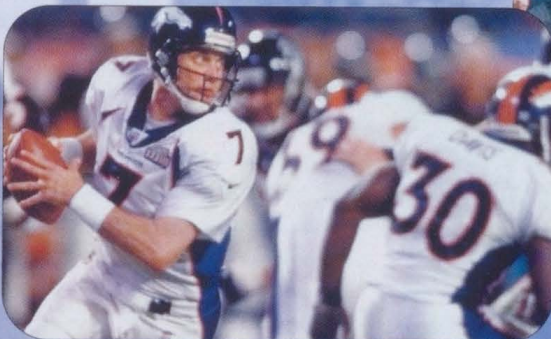

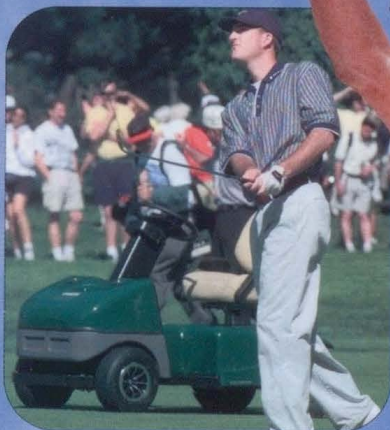

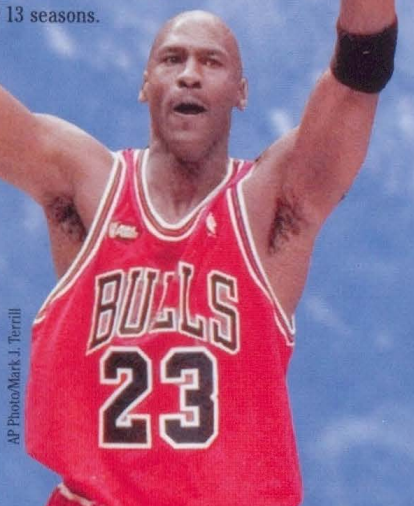
