LATE NEWS FLASHES

(I. N. S. Dispatch)

London, Oct. 1—Alan Cobham, Britain's foremost civilian airman returned today from a 28,000 mile round-trip flight to Melbourne, Australia. He completed his journey at 2:14 a. m.

Washington, Oct. 1—Great Britain has agreed to co-operate with the U. S. Prohibition authorities in checking rum runners from the Bahama Islands and other British ports.

San Francisco, Oct. 1—Colonel Alexander S. Williams, U. S. Marine Corps, defendant in the general Butler "cock tail case" was drowned here early today when his automobile plunged into San Francisco Bay from the Embarcadero.

Marysville—A committee was appointed to arrange for "another reunion" either here or in Urbana at a reunion of Survivors of ten regiments of the civil war held here yesterday.

Columbus—A general advance in the price of coal of 50 cents a ton was announced here today by retail dealers. The dealers said a similar increase was instituted at the mines yesterday.

Steuenville—A grand jury here refused to indict John Johnson for the murder of Christmas Natale. Natale was killed last May when Johnson, returning home found Natale making improper advances to Mrs. Johnson.

RETURN HOME

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 1—One man, believed to have been a bandit, was killed, probably by his companions, here today following a hold up in which a \$47,000 payroll was stolen from employees of the Henry Sonneborn Clothing Company.

Springfield, Ill., Oct. 1—The luck of Earl Lindberg, air mail pilot has again saved his life.

Lindberg who recently made a successful night parachute drop when his plane stalled near Ottawa, Ill., made a forced landing in a blinding rain storm near here last night and alighted safely in a field.

Farmers brought the pilot and his mail to Springfield. The landing gear of the plane was damaged.

Greenville, O. Oct. 1—George Ernest alias George Ead, was back in Greenville today to await a grand jury hearing in connection with the murder of Semon Penny, a policeman.

Ernest was arrested in Detroit two days ago and was identified as the man wanted here by a bullet wound, believed to have been inflicted in a gun fight with Penny.

Butte, Mont. Oct. 1—With the fury and strength of a maniac, Tony Veters, convicted of the murder of three men in Butte last November, launched an attack on his warders here today when they came to take him from his cell to the gallows.

Veters was finally subdued after tear gas was poured into his cell from all sides until he became unconscious. His legs and arms then were strapped as he lay upon the floor, but, upon being pushed between two guards on his way to the execution chamber, he regained consciousness sufficiently to vehemently curse his guards, dying with a curse upon his lips.

Veters dropped to his death at 12:28 and six minutes later was pronounced dead by jail officials.

When Undersheriff D. O. Robinson entered the cell to lead Veters out to hear the death warrant, the latter produced from his clothing a three-foot piece of pipe, which he hurled at the officer. As Robinson backed from cell, Veters pursued him with a crude knife fashioned from a spoon and other officers rushed to Robinson's aid, where he was driven back by the furious attack of the prisoner.

Two tanks of tear gas were brought into play. Screaming like a madman and with a fiendish expression on his face, Veters was backed into his cell. For a quarter of an hour the spray of gas was poured over him until he fell unconscious.

Veters was convicted of the slaying of Antone Favero, Joseph Ciccodagli and John Deranz, whom he is alleged to have ambushed and killed with a shotgun in East Butte. He protested his innocence to the last.

Steuenville O., Oct. 1—Openly charging that Mayor John S. H. Patton, of Steuenville, has permitted houses of ill fame, gambling and the liquor traffic to flourish without molestation in this city, Attorney W. R. Alban opened the fight of the ministerial association here today before Judge Jay S. Paisley to oust the mayor.

The morning session was consumed in a search for witnesses who failed to appear.

Alban then outlined his case, alleging, among other things, that the mayor permitted a carnival to operate despite a city ordinance which prohibits such shows.

Defense Attorney Carl H. Smith and Marshall filed an answer for the mayor, entering a general denial of all the charges. Defense counsel did not question any of the first witnesses, who were called for technical purposes to identify and certify the names of the petitioners. A village mayor who told of his officers finding liquor in raidists in the city and a dry raider who gave similar testimony were next called.

Etruscan Study Planned
 The Etruscans, predecessors of the Roman civilization in the Italian peninsula, are to have their little-known history investigated by a group of Italian scholars, who organized for this purpose at a national Etruscan congress recently held at Milan. Present knowledge of the Etruscan race and its culture is very fragmentary, though they had a high civilization and proud cities in Italy when Rome was a mere collection of huts beside the Tiber. Their influence was strongly felt in the days of the early republic, and survivals of their religion probably held in the cults of Rome to the very end of paganism. It is believed by one of the Italian scholars interested in the movement that the famous buried city of Pompeii was originally an Etruscan settlement.

Laboratory on Wheels

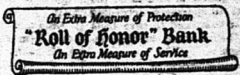

The Motor Shovel

In unloading ore or coal from the holds of vessels on the Great Lakes there is always a certain amount of material in corners and between batches that cannot be reached by the unloading buckets. The superintendent of one railway has designed a motor-driven scraper shovel that does such work much faster than it can be moved by hand.

The machine carries a shovel that can be raised and dumped automatically, but whenever possible the ore is pushed underneath the buckets, where the unloading buckets haul it out of the ship. The power-scraper shovel is said to do the work of 12 to 40 shovels, according to the type of boat, and to save from 50 to 75 hours' time in the unloading process.

Chinese Kitchens

Except for the fact that gas is the fuel instead of grass and wood, as in China, Chinese kitchens in American chop suey restaurants are closely fashioned after the pattern of the mud stoves in the Orient. There the stove is always broken before a family moves to a new abode. Here the kitchen range is built of tile, but still on the model of the old. The great shallow pans, the ladies and the oil pots, however, are strictly Chinese, and strange jars of wax constitute the scrub of a water plant imported from China, and other jars filled with slices of bamboo shoots are much in evidence among Chinese kitchens here in the East.

American Flowers to Bloom at Stockholm

Flowers from Yellowstone park will soon blossom in the royal gardens of the Swedish capital, according to word received in Washington by the United States national park service from Prof. H. S. Conrad of Grinnell college, director of the lecture and nature guide service in the park. During the recent tour of Crown Prince Gustavus Adolphus and his consort through Yellowstone National park, Professor Conrad was detailed to accompany the royal party and to give the prince, whom he found to be an enthusiastic and well-informed botanist, the benefit of his intimate knowledge of the mountain flora.
