SLATER IS AGAIN QUESTIONING PAT

McDermott Has Not Confessed; False Rumors Hinder Progress

Detective Hopes To Get Confession From McDermott This Afternoon.

(U. N. S. Dispatch)

Canton, O., Oct. 28.—Pining their faith in that the third attempt may prove the rule and they will be fortunate in breaking through Pat McDermott's impenetrable reserve and so learn the true details concerning the full details of the slaying of Don R. Mellett, Detective Slater and Prosecutor C. B. McIntock left for the Canton workhouse shortly after two o'clock this afternoon to again cross examine the alleged "trigger man."

BOD YOF MRS. MILLS EXHUMED

New Brunswick, N. J., Oct. 28.—The body of Mrs. Eleanor Mills will be lifted from its four year old grave in Episcopal cemetery here at one o'clock this afternoon and an autopsy performed by Dr. Otto H. Schmitz to determine whether the choir singer's tongue was cut out.

Special Prosecutor Alexander Simpson said he ordered a new autopsy performed following receipt of information from a Jersey City attorney that Mrs. Mills' tongue had been cut out by whoever murdered her and the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall. The coffin containing the body of Mrs. Eleanor Mills, who was murdered four years ago with the Rev. Edward W. Hall, was removed from its grave this afternoon. An autopsy will be performed later in the day to determine how the fatal bullet entered her tongue was cut out as has been reported.

AGED MAN BURNED TO DEATH AT GALION

Galion, O., Oct. 28.—Samuel Leasly, 75, was burned to death in his home here early this morning when he stumbled and overturned a small stove, igniting the building. Leasly, who is nearly blind, sought vainly to escape until suffocated by his burning clothes.

"BILLY" MCINTOCK'S WILL ADMITTED TO PROBATE

Springfield, Ill., Oct. 28.—(By I. N. S.)—Wm. D. Shepherd of Chicago, today won a point in his fight for the possession of the million-dollar estate of "Billy" McIntock when the state supreme court affirmed the verdict of the Cook county circuit court admitting McIntock's will to probate. "Billy" McIntock died at Shepherd's home in Chicago, following which Shepherd was tried and acquitted of a charge of poisoning the youth.

Following "Billy's" death, Shepherd produced a will which left the million-dollar estate entirely to Shepherd, with the exception of an \$8,000 annuity to Isabelle Pope, "Billy's" fiancée. McIntock also is survived by ten cousins.

The heirs claimed that Shepherd unduly influenced making of the will and, when Shepherd presented it for probate in Cook county, Judge Henry Horner refused to probate it.

Athens, O., Oct. 28.—H. A. Sines, state prohibition agent; J. M. Cady, deputy sheriff; Harry Dalton, constable, and Joe Jones, special officer, charged with manslaughter in the shooting of Lawrence Bolton, 26, here a week ago, were bound over to the grand jury this afternoon in bail of \$5,000 each when they waived hearings.

Mount Clemens, Mich., Oct. 28.—A military escort of three planes, headed by Major Thomas Lamphier, will fly over the funeral procession Saturday at Findlay, O., of Cadet Charles Wiseley of that city, who was killed in a crash at San Antonio.

Toledo, O., Oct. 28.—Police here today expressed the belief that the fiend who has been responsible for the deaths of five women and attacks upon a half dozen others be identified within a few hours.

Edmulated by the rewards totalling \$4,500, detectives and others have succeeded in arresting three persons whose actions have been suspicious and whose movements were vague. One of these is known to be an imbecile.

St. Petersburg, Fla., Oct. 28.—Mrs. Bertha White, 75, a winter visitor here for several seasons, who was the mother of Judge A. T. White, of Dayton, Ohio, died here today from injuries received when she was struck by a truck. R. L. Butterfield, driver of the truck, is held without bond pending the inquest.

Ashland, O., Oct. 28.—(By I. N. S.)—Walter J. (Wig) Pfeiffer, 30, director of Athletics at Ashland college, died in Samaritan hospital here today following an illness of several weeks. He is survived by his widow.

CLAIMS HE RECEIVED MESSAGE FROM MARS

(U. N. S. Dispatch)

London, Oct. 28.—A message from Mars has been received on this sphere according to Dr. Robinson, psychic expert, who yesterday paid commercial rates to have a message to Mars sent out by radio.

Dr. Robinson stated today that friends of his had picked-up a Martian reply to his message. He declared that the answer was "MM", received on a 30,000 meter wavelength. Further than this Dr. Robinson refused to go and would not translate his message to Mars, which read "U est nuptia secomba."

SUBMARINE NOT IN DANGER

New York, Oct. 28.—(By I. N. S.)—The Peruvian submarines R-1 and R-2, reported seriously disabled 130 miles off Cape May, N. J., did not send out an O. S. O. call last night and are in no danger of sinking, naval communications reported this morning. The R-1, carrying a crew of 22, accompanied by her sister ship with a crew of 20, left Newport, R. I., last Tuesday for Peru.

The distress call picked up at various coastal stations last night, apparently, was actuated by the fact that the R-2's engine was temporarily disabled and that she was being towed by her sister ship. The R-1 informed naval communications. The R-1 said the R-2 was in no danger and that her disabled engine was being repaired by the crew.

Hartford, O., Oct. 28.—Reed Zirkle, 25, of Racine, Wis., was instantly killed here this morning when his automobile struck a freight train. The impact was so great it was necessary to get a wreck train to extricate the body.

RUNAWAYS ARE CAUGHT BY MARION OFFICER

(U. N. S. Dispatch)

Marion, O., Oct. 28.—The elopement of an 18 year old girl and a 19 year old sweetheart which occurred at their home Warsaw, N. Y., on August 5, last, and was followed by a devious journey covering hundreds of miles through several states, came to an end in Marion today when the two wanderers were placed under arrest in a local hotel. They were registered as Mr. and Mrs. C. Young, Charleston, W. Va.

The runaways, Lauretta McClure, 18 and Merral Madison 19, came to grief when they asked a Marion police officer the direction to a hotel. Noting the youthful appearance of the girl, the police officer made investigation and the arrest followed.

Madison confessed, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of contributing of a minor and was given an indeterminate sentence in the Mansfield reformatory. The girl is being held here. Probate officers say she may be sent to the girl's industrial home at Delaware.

HERRIN ILLINOIS AGAIN IN MIDST OF UPRISAL

(U. N. S. Dispatch)

Herrin, Ill., Oct. 28.—Martial law for "Bloody Williamson county" before the election next Tuesday was predicted today as a renewal of the feud warfare between the Birger and Shelton factions seemed imminent.

The roadside murder of two Birger henchmen, Tuesday, was followed today by the burning of four roadhouses between Johnson City and West Fankfort, a Birger stronghold, at the hands of three automobiles loads of armed men.

Charles Birger and his men have gathered in force at one of their roadhouse headquarters, while the Shelton faction is assembling at West City, about 20 miles north of Marion. Both sides are heavily armed and armored cars in evidence.

Four national guard officers have arrived in the district as observers.

Prosecutor and Slater Make Signed Statement

Expect Confession In Next 24 Hours. Have Been Making Steady Progress.

(U. N. S. Dispatch)

Canton, O., Oct. 28.—"Pat McDermott has not confessed."

Despite all reports to the contrary the alleged "trigger man" in the slaying of Don R. Mellett on the morning of July 16 has not divulged who killed Mellett or under what circumstances the crime was committed.

This was the flat statement made to International News Service today by Prosecutor C. B. McIntock and Ora Slater, Ohio's detective ace.

They also issued the following statement over their signatures:

"Pat McDermott has not confessed. He has, however, given some important information which can not be divulged at this time. We are, however, making satisfactory progress.

Signed C. B. McIntock.

Ora Slater.

Aroused to indignation over the false reports being disseminated that McDermott had confessed and incriminated Ben Rudner and Louis Mazer both indicted on charges of first-degree murder as a result of the Mellett slaying, together with an unnamed former member of the Canton police department, Slater and McIntock called International News Service correspondent into their office and asked that the statement that such reports were absolutely untrue be published.

"Publication of false reports of this sort obstruct the course of justice and hinder us in our investigation," McIntock said.

"We seem to have McDermott on the verge of talking and then, by some grape-vine intelligence system, he learns of these stories and refuses to hold any further conversation, claiming that we are proving untrue confidences."

Both investigators are hopeful of getting McDermott to tell his whole story within the next 24 hours.

Discovery of the location of his hide-away in Cleveland, through information received by Slater, has materially strengthened the probe.

Evidence which may lead to the discovery of the higher-up back of the Mellett murder, will be forthcoming when investigators ascertain the identity of the person who signed the check for \$500 which Pat used of pay rent for the apartment where he was hiding.

Slater is tracing the person whose signature is attached to the check and hopes that within a few hours he will be able to name at least one of the group of men who instigated the murder.

This check, according to John Brington, janitor and caretaker of the apartment where McDermott stayed, was in his brief drawn on a branch of the Union-Trust Company of Cleveland, and police and bank officials are checking back in an effort to learn the identity of the signer.

Nantyglo, Pa., Oct. 28.—A letter from Thomas J. McDermott, brother of Patrick McDermott, so-called key figure in the Don R. Mellett murder, to Mrs. Mellett, widow of the Canton publisher offering her the \$5,000 reward was entitled to receive for Pat's capture was in the mails today. Thomas McDermott said at his home here.

The letter, addressed to Mrs. Mellett in care of the Canton News, asked her to accept the money, "if not for yourself, for the education of the children of Don R. Mellett," and expressed sympathy for the McDermott family for the widow.

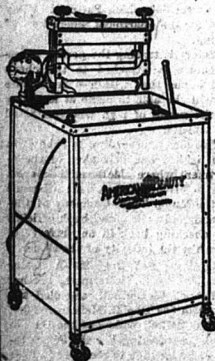

ONE KILLED; OTHERS INJURED WHEN CAR RUNS WILD

(L. N. S. Dispatch)

Wheeling W. Va. Oct 26—One man was killed, seven persons were seriously injured, two of whom may die and a score of other passengers suffered slight injuries when a street car operating to Mozart park ran away on a steep grade at the foot of the long hill and crashed through a store as it failed to negotiate a turn early this morning.

Frank S. Eberlein, 65 motorman on the car, was dead when extricated from the wrecked vestibule, Joseph Gaus 46, conductor, suffered a broken leg and internal injuries. He is not expected to live. George Rempeke, 50, a passenger, also suffered internal injuries and may die.

The trolley, carrying many to work had slipped and skidded several times going down the hill. A heavy fog is believed to have made the rails slippery. As it struck the last steep grade the car gathered momentum, careened as it swung a sharp curve and then darted down the last 200 yards, a straight stretch of track.

Traveling at terrific speed, it dashed across a bridge, hit the last turn toward the level road, reared on its side and crashed all the way through the Leo Peck store, burying the vestibule of the car in the hill at the back of the store.

JOKER KILLED WHEN HE STAGES FAKE HOLDUP

Cincinnati, O. Oct 26—A would-be bandit, identified as Louis Heller, 40 salesman, was dead here today, following an attempt to execute a drug store holdup with an unloaded revolver.

Heller was shot last night by Frank Amann, drugist police reported, after he had ordered the storekeeper to "hand over the money."

Taken to a hospital by detectives, the dying man declared, "It was all a joke—my gun wasn't even loaded." Investigation disclosed that his gun contained no bullets but police exonerated Amann of all blame.

The dead man came here from Allentown, Pa. about a year ago, it was said.

Another song with the same title was given by a mixed chorus of High school boys and girls, also led by Miss Tenney.

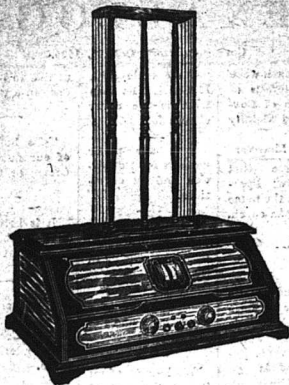
Miss Mary Emily Dunham sang, and Jack Berryhill gave a saxophone number.
