"Publication of false reports of this sort obstruct the course of justice and hinder us in our investigation," McClintock said.

"We seem to have McDermott on the verge of talking and then, by some grape-vine intelligence system, he learns of these stories and refuses

to hold any further conversation, claiming that we are proving unrue confidences.

Both investigators are hopeful of geting McDermott to fall his whole story within the next 24 hours.




