BROTHERS REFUSE TO AID PATRICK McDERMOTT

Court House, Canton, O. Dec. 8.—Brotherly love availed Patrick E. McDermott nothing today when his two brothers, Tom and Bernard, refused to aid him in the fight for vindication of the murder of Don R. Mellett, crusading newspaper publisher.

For nearly two hours this morning the accused man argued and pleaded with his brothers to sign an affidavit to support his counsel's argument that the state has not given him a "fair break" and that he cannot get impartial trial in Stark county.

Despite the fact that Pat waxed warm during the time he entreated his brothers to join him, they turned a deaf ear at least temporarily, to his fervent plea.

The defense had filed two affidavits in support of their motion for a change of venue.

Washington—Former Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall and Harry Sinclair, millionaire oil operator, will be arraigned for conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the leasing of the Teapot Dome oil reserve, on December 17, it was decided today, following a conference between special government oil counsel and Justice Baye, of the District of Columbia supreme court.

Actual trial date will be set for after this holidays.

Washington—While congress accorded not a lukewarm reception to the multitude of proposals contained in President Coolidge's 12,000-word message it seemed fairly certain today that his chief recommendation will be carried out.

That is his admission to congress not to rock the boat.

Comparatively few of the recommendations Mr. Coolidge made stand any chance of enactment at the present short session. The time is too short and the opposition within and without his party is too great. But just as the partisan scrapping will prevent accomplishment of his program, so will the same scrapping prevent enactment of the legislation sponsored by his opponents.

Washington—The Democratic offensive in the congressional battle over disposition of the treasury's huge surplus was launched today with the introduction of a \$335,000,000 tax-reduction bill by Representative Garner, of Texas, ranking Democrat on the ways and means committee.

Washington, Dec. 8.—A protest against the expenditure of the government funds to maintain a secret service man with John Coolidge, son of the President a student at Amherst, was made by representative Byrnes (D) of Tennessee, during hearings of the treasury and post office appropriation bill, which was laid before the house today.

LATE NEWS FLASHES

(I. N. S. Dispatch)

Detroit.—Shipping was at a stand still in the Detroit river yesterday as he result of the ice blockade in St. Mary's river near Sault Ste. Marie. Great cakes of ice are drifting down the river which is coated with a crust of thin ice between Windsor and Detroit.

Princeton, Mass.—Sails ripped to threads by stiff gales and rudders drifting before the howling wind, the three-master New York bound lumber laden schooner W. M. Reinhardt was tossed about, a helpless wreck, off Cape Race early yesterday.

Seven men aboard, working frantically at the pumps and shooting up rockets of distress, had about given up hope when coast guardsmen came up, shot a line aboard the schooner and rescued the seamen by means of a breeches buoy.

Washington — Representatives Fitzgerald, of Ohio, will introduce a bill in congress for a \$1,500,000 appropriation for the construction of a new hospital at Dayton, Ohio, home for disabled soldiers, he announced yesterday.

This hospital will replace existing buildings which have been condemned.

The board of managers of the National Soldier's home, holding its quarterly meeting here called at the White House yesterday and discussed the soldier's homes operation with the President.

Columbus, O. Dec. 8.—Ohio today mourns the passing of one of her prominent citizens, former Attorney General Timothy S. Hogan. An extended illness, due to pernicious anemia, terminated in the death of General Hogan at his home here early this morning. He is 65 years of age.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Rum boat is trying to stage a Christmas come back. Reports to coast-guard headquarters today disclosed that six of eight foreign rum ships are lying about 200 miles off New York with large cargoes of choice wet goods.

Air plane scouts and destroyers are operating off the coast, radiating the exact location of the rummies. As fast as their positions are charted on the coast guard "war map" patrol boats are despatched to remain as escorts for the rum ships as long as they stay in coast wise waters.

Washington, Dec. 8.—The illness of E. L. Doheny, millionaire oil operator, who, with former Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall, is standing trial for conspiracy, probably will delay final presentation of the case to jury until well into next week, attorneys for both sides agreed today. Doheny's infected arm already has forced a full days adjournment, cancellation of night sessions and several early recesses.

The Billingsley family were allied with the Reform Church.

Mr. Billingsley spent his whole life in the old home community, but had a large acquaintance among business men, stockmen and others. This extended throughout the entire state of Ohio.

He has been very prominent as a stockman and as a farmer.

He was everywhere known and highly regarded for his general disposition and sterling qualities as a business man. Many are the tributes paid to him on account of his integrity and attitude as shown to those with whom he dealt.

FROZEN BODY OF MURDERED WOMAN FOUND IN SHED
Ashtabula, O.—Following the discovery of the frozen body of Mrs. Eva Hanold, 51, who had been murdered police say, with a small sledgehammer, authorities are seeking a man who visited her home here last night.

President Coolidge Urges Observance Of International Golden Rule Sunday



PRESIDENT COOLIDGE again asks America to observe International Golden Rule Sunday. By Presidential endorsement the day has been observed for the past three years to aid child welfare and relief work of the Near East Relief. "This year the day will have the additional significance of aiding the earthquake victims of Armenia."

The President's letter of endorsement follows:

"I regard International Golden Rule Sunday as a movement of much importance, begun in an attempt to care for the orphaned children of Bible lands, it has been extended to other countries.

"Practical help is the best expression of friendship. The aid we may give out of our abundance to those less fortunately situated than we should be of great value in bringing about the application of the Golden Rule to the settlement of misunderstandings among nations as well as among individuals.

"I hope the voluntary observance of this day may become increasingly prevalent in America and throughout the world."
