## News Flashes

(L. N. S. Dispatch)

Gallipolis, O.—Galan Mulford, 18, was killed instantly yesterday and his father, Elza, was injured when a tobacco-loaded truck overturned here.

Bellefontaine, O.—Farm relief legislation and the passage of the McNary-Haugen bill are favored in a resolution passed by the Logan Co. Farm Bureau by vote of 16 to 3.

Marion, O.—Miss Wilma Roecker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Roecker, of that city, is the only girl in the senior class at Ohio State University this year seeking a bachelor of architecture degree.

Marysville, O.—Plans have been completed for the high schools of Marysville, Richwood and Plain City to debate on the question, "Resolved, That Allied War Debts to the United States should be cancelled" on the night of February 7.

Cincinnati—A man registered at the Newland hotel as Ronda E. Hills, telegraph operator, Toledo, Ohio, was killed instantly yesterday when he plunged from a third-story window of the hotel. It is not known whether he fell accidentally or whether he planned to take his life.

Indianapolis—More than twenty passengers were injured, three seriously, when a Big Four passenger train collided with a Pennsylvania passenger train in the downtown district here yesterday. The westbound Big Four train was switched on the wrong tracks, it was said.

Mansfield, O.—This city's tax rate has been cut \$18 per thousand dollars valuation, a reduction of \$6.80, as a result of revaluation of the Richland county budget commission. The lower tax rate will not materially reduce taxes because of the increased property valuation set by the commission.

Cincinnati, O.—Out on the deep, when the sun is low, and the breezes are blowing may be alright for a person with plenty of clothes, in the opinion of C. H. Nieman, manager of the U. S. Glue Company, here.

When Nieman took a trip to England in 1925 he states in a suit filed against C. C. C. of St. Louis, Railroad his baggage was placed on the wrong ship, and left him to the mercy of the waves with but meagre wearing apparel.

He blames the railroad for the misfortune and asks \$1,572 damages.

Mansfield, O.—Jesse E. Ladow, a member of the Richland-county bar for more than 35 years, has been disbarred from practice for the remainder of his life being adjudged guilty by Common Pleas Judge J. W. Galbraith of misconduct involving moral turpitude. Ladow pleaded guilty last summer in federal court at Cleveland to influencing jurors in the Josiah Kirby trial and was released November 24 from the Dayton workhouse, where he served a sentence of five months imposed by Federal Judge John M. Killits. He also paid a \$2,500 fine.

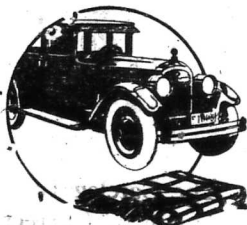

## LATE NEWS FLASHES

Columbus—The state legislature would be asked to enact necessary legislation to enable the state to take over maintenance of the entire state highway system, relieving the counties of necessity for participation, under the terms of a resolution adopted by the Ohio Good Roads Federation in session here.

Cincinnati—Charles Smedley, attorney and former dry agent, sentenced to thirty days in jail yesterday for having operated an automobile when he was intoxicated, was dead here today. He was found by guards as they were making their rounds late last night.

Columbus—One hundred and forty students from nine of the eleven colleges of Ohio State University will graduate December 22. Men outnumber the girl graduates two to one and eleven states are represented in the list. The college of arts will graduate the majority of the students included.

Governor Vic Donahey of a commission to examine the mental condition of Robert Thompson, convicted of murdering a ten year old girl at Coshocton was pronounced today. Thompson is under arrest to be electrocuted on January 7th.

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Columbus—With her skull fractured, Mrs. Jennie Nye was in a critical condition at St. Francis hospital today. While crossing High street, she was hit by an auto driven by Arthur Barr. Police exonerated Barr.

Chillicothe, O.—The case of Mounts Hefkman, indicted on a charge of first-degree murder for the alleged killing of Officer Dan Garrett here, is expected to go to the grand jury this afternoon.

Columbus Daniel Turner, 63, a track worker, was instantly killed when he was run down by a Pennsylvania switch engine in the yards here.

Washington, Albert Fall and E. L. Doherty today were acquitted of conspiracy to defraud the government in leasing of naval oil reserves.

The verdict was rendered by a youthful jury, that for more than three weeks sat in the District supreme court and witness done of the keenest legal battles in American court annals.

The government thus lost the first of its criminal cases against those charged with being the central figures and conspirators in the "oil scandals" of the Harding administration.

Both Fall and Doherty were obviously overjoyed and gratified over the verdict.

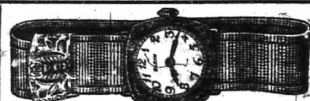
