**LATE NEWS FLASHES**

(I. N. S. Dispatch)

New York—The voice of the Old World sounded across the Atlantic today and the voice of the New World echoed back.

At 8:44 o'clock this morning, commercial radio telephone service was inaugurated for the first time in history between New York and London.

The telephone conversation lasted five minutes and parties at both ends heard each other distinctly.

Transatlantic radiophone service after two hours of satisfactory service today, was temporarily discontinued, due to heavy static, it was announced by the American Telegraph and Telephone Company.

The company refused to divulge the number of calls which had been completed or the amount of tolls taken in, merely stating the commercial communication had been accomplished "that except for periods of heavy static, would be kept up continuously. It was hoped to resume communication with London later in the day.

Troy, Ohio, Jan. 7.—The Miami county grand jury, this afternoon, returned an indictment of second degree murder against Raymon Kadel, 28, a farmer residing near Christiansburg.

The grand jury had been considering the manner of his wife's death which resulted from a fractured skull on November 28. The investigation has continued since Wednesday.

Kadel was taken into custody last evening and placed in the county jail.

The arrest of Kadel climaxed an investigation begun with the coroner's inquest conducted by H. O. Brower into the mysterious injury of Mrs. Kadel resulting in her death about which her husband is said to hold several conflicting stories.

After her death from a fractured skull the husband said she had been injured when she jumped from their automobile when returning to their home near Christiansburg, Champlain county, but he at first had said his wife was asleep and fell from the auto.

At the coroner's inquest he testified that she had become angry when he refused to kiss her and jumped from the automobile.

The third time according to his story, he did not see or hear her until she had leaped from the car except he saved her foot as she was falling. This incident at the inquest was said to have occurred on the Urbana pike, four miles west of Troy.

The date of his arraignment has been set for January 12 at 9:00 a. m.

**SERVICES AT CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN TONIGHT**

Rev. Omer S. Thomas will speak this evening at the Church of the Brethren upon the subject, "Educational Tendencies, Secular and Spiritual," at 7 o'clock.

The services will be held promptly between seven and eight o'clock so that those attending the Lyceum number at the Auditorium may have opportunity to go to both.

Rev. William Christian, the new pastor of the Presbyterian Church speaks last night on "Obedience to the Law" Mr. Christian gave very strong statements as to this attitude upon subject. He based his remarks upon the 13th of Romans. "Let every soul be subject unto higher powers" He divided his subject into three aspects of higher law, First, physical development, showing the need of strength from right living that the body could perform the work to which it is called. He spoke of the interest aroused in youth to the call of life in a physical way. The sports and outside living and breathing God's fresh air bro't strength for living. It is not to be ignored by christians that a healthful body could accomplish greater things.

The second law of life was the civil, also ordained of God, Rulers were not a terror to good work but to the evil! Christ in his life was subject even to the Roman rule over his own people, for he had said, "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's." Rev. Christian said he had adopted the United States as his own country because of the Eighteenth amendment and hoped there would never be a repeal of this law against strong drink. He insisted that all true Christians should stand together against a change in the Constitution, against he law of prohibition.

The last and highest law of life was the spiritual. This to the christian was more than a moral or religious self righteousness which was denounced by Christ. There could be no less than the word spoken by Christ to his followers: "Love one another even as I have loved you." This said the speaker was higher than that of the ten commandments, "as thyself," but was to be followed as Christ showed forth in his life here, and could be accomplished only through trust in himself, and acceptance of his sacrifice for sin.

The church was filled last night and the pastors are asking that a good number will attend the service this evening and Sunday evening, at the Church of the Brethren.

Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. F. B. FITZWATER, D.D., Dean of the Evangelical Seminary, Moody Institute of Chicago.)

Lesson for January 9

THE STANDARD OF CHRISTIAN LIVING

LESSON TEXT—Luke 8:17-18. GOLDEN TEXT—Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect.

PRIMARY TOPIC—How Jesus Wants Us to Live. JUNIOR TOPIC—Marching Orders for Christ.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—What Christ Requires of Us. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULTS TOPIC—Christ's Life and Example for Us.

The context (v. 28) clearly implies what is elsewhere positively declared (John 15:18-21; Luke 21:17) that the followers of Christ will be hated and opposed. In this lesson Christ sets forth the principles governing the life of his followers.

I. "Love Your Enemies" (v. 27). Love here is not a natural affection. To love friends is easy, but to love enemies is only possible to those who have been made partakers of the divine nature—been born again.

II. "Do Good to Them Which Hate You" (v. 27). Love is positive in its nature. The true Christian will not merely refrain from doing injury to one who hates him, but will be concerned with and engaged in doing good to him. True love acts according to its own essential nature.

III. "Bless Them That Curse You" (v. 28).

To bless means to speak well of—to invoke a blessing upon. Injury by words is hard to let go unchallenged. The one who is a child of God and allows the Spirit of his Maker and Redeemer to express itself through him will return blessings for cursings.

IV. "Pray for Them Which Despitefully Use You" (v. 28). We should pray for those who abuse us. The best commentary on this precept is Christ's own example (Luke 23:34). "Father forgive them for they know not what they do. When Christ was reviled He reviled not again. When He suffered, He threatened not, but committed Himself to Him that judgeth righteously. (1 Pet. 2:23).

V. Patiently Endure Wrong and Injury" (v. 29).

The Christian is not to bristle in defense of his rights but rather to suffer insult, injury and even loss. This expresses the law which should govern the individual's actions, but should not be pressed so far that evil-doers can go unchecked. Rightly constituted government has been ordained of God for the protection of the innocent and the punishment of evildoers (Rom. 13:1-8).

VI. Give to Every One That Asks of Thee (v. 30).

God is the supreme example. He gives freely and generously but intelligently. This text does not authorize indiscriminate giving. There is a giving which injures the one to whom the gift is made. To give a man money to buy whisky would be wrong.

VII. Do as You Wish to Be Done By (v. 31).

This is called the Golden Rule. It is the sum total of Christian duty as it pertains to human interrelations. Human beings carry with them the consciousness which is the touchstone which teaches them their duty to others. If men were to live up to this rule the problem of capital and labor would be solved and end would be put to war. International relations would be peacefully adjusted and all protesting in business would end. Practicing this precept proves that we are children of God. Loving those who love us, doing good to those who do good to us, lending to those who lend to us, is the common practice even of sinners. No new birth, no Holy Spirit needed to live this kind of life.

VIII. Be Merciful (v. 30). This means to be filled with pity and compassion. To enter into sympathy with every need of others. The supreme example as to this is the Heavenly Father.

IX. Censorious Judgments Condemned (v. 27).

This means that we should not seek out the evil or faults in others for our satisfaction. We should not sit in censorious judgment upon the actions of others. However, it does not prohibit the just estimation of the character of others by their deeds.

X. The Compensations of Right Living (v. 35).

The one who gives freely of money, loves sincerely, makes the Golden Rule the standard of his life, shows mercy and kindness to others, and refrains from judging the motives of others, will be fully rewarded in kind. God will see to it that there's no loss.
