Columbus, Ohio, Feb 15.- The Just-er of caring for Ohio's large populat-a of convicted criminals is becoming or convicted criminals is becoming most acute, and while many suggestions have been mad for solving the problem one of them seems to meet with approval. The Ohio penitientiary is entirely too small to care for its prisoners.
